From the Vicarage

I'll be honest with you, I tend to find Winter to be a season of mystery. Perhaps it's the chill in the air upon which one's breath lingers evocatively. Perhaps it's the way the darkness encroaches on the day's activities, such that roads around the village are illuminated by torch light as people walk their dogs, head home from the bus, or make their way out to the pub. Perhaps it's the sense that everything is winding down into a kind of hibernation. The garden has been put to bed. Most building projects are on pause, or have refocused on being indoors. It's not that life doesn't carry on, but somehow we are confined to



our bubbles of light; whether in our homes or with our torches, or even by our phones and devices. Gone are the bright open skies of summer and in draws the blankets of morning mists and early dusks, with evenings which seem to linger.

This atmosphere of mystery can lead to us to reflect on things in a way which we might not ordinarily. We can find ourselves drawn to old memories of years gone by, or acutely aware of those who are not going to be with us for Christmas this year - or, for better or worse, of those who are going to be coming for Christmas! We may wonder where the year disappeared to, or have our own hopes and fears of what the future may hold for us. We find our thoughts in the realms of recollection and imagination, of what was or might have been and of what may or may not come to pass. This is a natural part of the human experience, which is why Dickens' A Christmas Carol has resonated these last two hundred years.

Yet for all that winter has a mysterious aesthetic, there is at Christmas time another kind of mystery. A true mystery found within the story of the nativity; it's a mystery of which the unfolding is often somewhat spoiled, just as finding out the who or how of an Agatha Christie novel at the start dispels the intrigue and robs the joy of piecing it together one's self. (I have often enjoyed Agatha Christie novels, yet have only twice been correct in my guess before the reveal!) We can all too often find that the Nativity story at Christmas is over commercialised, or made 'cute' by Children's performances, or worse yet that it is politicised for various different causes. However if we allow ourselves to slow down and not jump ahead to the conclusion, we can find ourselves engaging in a surprisingly tangible and all too human mystery.

When we imagine Mary and her pregnancy we find an experience which we all have encountered, for even if we have not been pregnant ourselves we have all been born of pregnant women and through family, friends, coworkers, and neighbours have witnessed the changes pregnancy brings about and the hope that everything will go well for both mother and child. Where pregnancy now is surrounded by ultrasounds and appointments with midwives, Mary's pregnancy was heralded by a stranger with a prophecy. She had to travel with her Fiancé to his hometown, and at every step the ordinary experience of being an expectant Mum was accompanied by mysterious coincidences and happenings. When we step out of the carols and into the stable we are presented with the greatest mystery of all; that somehow the vast and incomprehensible divine being we call God lies wrapped in swaddling cloths as a baby in the arms of Mary. That which is beyond our imagination has become something, someone, which we can recognise, grasp, and understand.

In the darkness of winter we live in our bubbles of light, whether at home or illuminated by torches. In the darkness of the world and our hearts, at Christmas the light of the world steps into our lives as a baby boy called Jesus.

This is the true mystery of the season. It's a moment which lingers and we would love to share and explore that mystery together; whether that be at our Christingle service, a Crib service, tree festival, evenings singing carols or that ancient and noble tradition of the midnight mass, you are all most warmly invited to wrap up, brave the cold dark winter and step into the light of Christ in our Churches this Christmas.

Holy Trinity Heritage Weekend

As it has been for a good number of years Holy Trinity Church Penn was opened as part of Heritage Open Days for the weekend of 8th - 10th September. Sadly we did not have as many visitors as usual I think partly due to the fact that there were quite a few other events happening that weekend locally. However those that did come were very pleased to hear talks by Miles Green and Jane White, who were as usual full of interesting information. Visitors were also able to see the brasses which are normally covered by a carpet and several took the opportunity to go up to see the bells in the bell tower guided by some of the bell ringers. Most of the visitors rounded off their visit with tea and cakes which were served at the back of church.

We decided to hold the 1994 centenary celebration for Penn Parish Council in the old Parish Room on Paul's Hill, which we had not used for 20 years, and there we found a locked wall safe but could discover no key. A quote of at least £200 from a locksmith was thought to be too much for opening a probably empty safe. We appealed in Village Voice, 'Wanted - Local safebreaker', expressing the hope

that someone with the appropriates experience could be found in our respectable community. The story found its way into the Daily Telegraph. Independent Television News spotted it and rang offering to pay for opening the safe if they could film it.

In the event, it took two experts only a few minutes and we waited until the camera was rolling, before swinging open the heavy door to reveal a safe crammed full of old documents. There were all the early Parish Council records back to 1894, an 1838 Penn Parish Tithe map, various property deeds and the records of parish administration by the Vestry for a century before the Parish Council was set up.

Until 1834, parishes were almost entirely self-contained, setting and collecting rates to cover everything we now expect from central and local government: poor relief, care for the elderly, the sick, orphans and unemployed, immigration and emigration, repair of the highways, law and order, and of course, the church. In fact, the Vestry ran a parish-sized welfare state and there in the safe we found all the details of it with the earliest reference as far back as 1698. For a local historian, it was a once in a lifetime, manna from heaven, and has provided a wealth of information.

This marvellous surprise was duly shown to the world on ITN's lunch-time news. It was picked up by CNN and my next-door neighbour, dining that night in a hotel in Brussels, was astonished to see two very familiar faces appear on her screen.

The safe was taken out of the wall and moved to Penn Church Hall from where, not long afterwards, it was stolen by thieves, presumably assuming it must contain valuable contents. I remember my feeling of panic when I heard the news until I remembered that I had already removed all the documents. A few days later, the empty safe was found, abandoned by the roadside the other side of Beaconsfield.
